A Building Partnership

In December, the Tribe and the city of Highland launched the Holly Circle Drive pavement improvement project to effectively address the severe damage and deterioration of a hillside residential roadway off Orange Street. This initiative is part of a robust 20-year effort to enhance local infrastructure, made possible through a strong partnership between the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians, the cities of San Bernardino and Highland, and San Bernardino County.

This collaboration began with the construction of sound walls and median improvements along Victoria Avenue at a cost of \$5.5 million. Following our success with this initial project, a more ambitious project was completed between 2018 and 2019 at a cost of \$10.7 million. This project restored paving from the ground up and added essential storm drains, curbs, gutters and new street lighting along Victoria Avenue from Lynwood Drive to Third Street, while also completely restoring roads in nearby neighborhoods.

As we celebrate these accomplishments, we look forward to upcoming traffic construction improvements. Notably, the Tribe is working with the city to evaluate the installation of swing-arm gates at Citrus Street and Mirada Street to manage and limit cut-through traffic. This initiative will better enable San Bernardino Police Department officers to conduct enhanced patrols and traffic control in the service area, under a contract that has been in place for 15 years.

The restoration of Holly Circle Drive, along with these strategic infrastructure initiatives, reflects our unwavering commitment to addressing community infrastructure and public safety needs.

Highland Senior Center Grand Reopening

The Highland Senior Center, located on the grounds of Patton State Hospital, has served the needs of our community's seniors for over 100 years. Recently, the center underwent significant renovations funded by a \$500,000 grant from the Tribe and celebrated a ribbon cutting this fall. Officials, including San Manuel Chairwoman Lynn Valbuena and San Manuel Tribal Council Secretary and center Board Member Audrey Martinez attended the celebration.

The center serves over 10,000 seniors monthly, offering fitness classes, meals and social activities, along with a food pantry that operates twice weekly. Every room has new flooring and fresh paint; the restrooms now meet ADA standards. The kitchen has new appliances for serving hot meals. These upgrades will help the center apply for more grants for meals and other services for homebound seniors.
